A CALL FOR A COMEBACK

"Comeback is a good word, man!" -Mickey Rourke

"No one makes a comeback like Jesus; Church, it's time to come back." I said these words in my yard in front of the camera recording as a way of communicating the new health safety plan for our church. As soon as I said them, I felt overwhelmed with the joy of the Spirit. We, as a people, love stories of comebacks, last minute saves, and amazing grit in the face of overwhelming odds. Church, this is our moment.



2020 was the year of Covid's Cancel, and 2021 seemed to start out as the year of setbacks. Each time we made a first down, it seemed like something would push us backwards. We have vaccines, but there are questions and hesitations (and not all of them unfounded). We don't have mask mandates, but now there are variants more contagious and deadly. We have church in person again, but how will it be in the "new normal?"

Hear me clearly: Christ is the King of Comebacks. When they beat him down, he got back up. When they mocked him with a crown of thorns, he held his head up with humility. When they pushed him down and nailed him on the cross, he said all humanity would come to him as he was lifted up. When they buried him in death, rolling a stone over the entrance to seal his fate, he rose. Church, he's still rising.

Christ is the King of Comebacks. When we feel our hearts sinking into the mire of depression, Jesus offers us a hand to help us walk upon the waters. When the storms of division and dissension punch conflict and bully us with fear, Jesus stands up with authority and says, "Peace, be still." When we feel like the world has gone to hell in a handbasket and sin rules where death hasn't already destroyed, Christ rises.

Christ is the King of Comebacks; Church, it's time for us to come back. Come back with faithful worship. Come back with devoted small groups. Come back in prayer-filled hymns and praise. Come back to radical community outreach and intentional connectional missions. Come back to experiencing Christ in Church. *Covid-19 never stood a chance against our Savior*.

I'm officially declaring September 12 "Come Back Sunday." We're going to have a picnic with food, games, fellowship, and the love of God in each smile. No one makes a comeback like Jesus; Church, we're called to come back. Amen.

MUSIC NOTES


Let's get back into the SING of things! As the season of fall approaches, let's fall back into some good rehearsal habits as our music groups prepare to lead in worship.

STEPHEN MINISTRY MOMENT—We Need You!

By now, you all know that CUMC is blessed to have an active Stephen Ministry Team. But did you know that YOU, our congregation, can make an important difference in someone's life by letting them know we have trained caregivers called Stephen Ministers who come alongside people during difficult times?

A number of us are feeling better now. Many have returned to church, our choir is singing, and we are seeing friends and family. But not all of us are there yet. There is still a big worry about the Delta variant that is contributing to increased COVID infections. Many are juggling work, childcare, and schooling. Financial strain is still present for many families, and most of us still have uncertainty about the future. Some of us are struggling with the loss of loved ones along with other personal challenges. This is where our Stephen Ministers step in. No one has to face these life events alone. We are here to listen, care, encourage, and provide emotional and spiritual support. It's high-quality care – and completely confidential.

Look around you. Are there people you sit with at our Sunday services, people in your Sunday school class, or maybe someone who doesn't go to our church who would benefit from the caring presence of a Stephen Minister? We need you to be our **Lookouts**. While Stephen Ministers are well trained to reach out and help others, unless we know that someone is hurting, we can't be there to help. And this is where YOU, our congregation, can be of help to us, to Pastor Nathan, and to Pastor Chad. When you encounter someone who is struggling with life's challenges, you want to listen to them in a caring way. Then explain a little about how Stephen Ministry works (we have brochures if you need one). Before doing anything else, you want to get their permission to connect them with one of our Pastors, Stephen Leaders, or Stephen Ministers. If that person agrees, then quickly pass the information along (see below). If that person says no, just give them time to think about it and ask again. Avoid promising someone a Stephen Minister, as all cases have to be considered appropriate for this ministry.

By being a **Lookout**, each one of you can be a vital part of this process. You will be paving the way to help our Stephen Ministry Team assist in meeting needs for care in both our congregation and community.

Pastor Nathan shared in a recent sermon that he had a conversation with a woman at a blood drive because she was wearing a "Battle 22" t-shirt. Nathan was aware of the movement and struck up a conversation with the woman. A basic conversation with someone who wears a t-shirt that draws our interest is just one way to be in relationship with one of God's children.

Another way to be in relationship is to volunteer at community events. This type of mission work means different things for different people. We are not all called to the same ministry – and that's OK. What's important is to answer the call that God puts on your heart.

Recently, several adults and youth answered the call to serve the Greenleigh community. On August 26, there was a ceremony to recognize Comcast for donating equipment and services to provide internet at the YMCA Cottage (aka the Y trailer). The internet service will provide the opportunity for students to work on their school work and other programs that the Y provides at the Cottage after school. This service will fill a big gap in what the Y has been able to provide to the students in Greenleigh.

After the ceremony, there was a community celebration to lift up the residents in the community. The celebration included games for the kids, free popsicles & water, and a Chesterfield Fire Truck was on site. The day also included having a mobile COVID vaccination clinic on site, as well as the DMV to provide ID cards.

There are many mission opportunities available around us if we seek them out. It might be helping high schoolers with homework at REST STOP, donating groceries for the Backpack Ministry, or providing supplies for the Christmas Shoeboxes, or school supplies for Broad Rock Elementary.

With the start of the new school year, CUMC will again bless, out of our abundance, those children facing food insecurity from Curtis and CC Wells Elementary Schools. Historically, we have provided about 50 bags of food each weekend (each bag is designed to feed two children). We include mostly shelf stable, nonperishable items such as: peanut butter, canned pasta (like ravioli), soup, boxed mac and cheese, canned fruit, Tuna Helper, canned meats (tuna, Spam, etc.), toaster pastries, oatmeal, fruit chews, and peanut butter crackers. These bags provide more than just food – they provide



care, love, and support. As always, I am thankful for those who have contributed to this mission.

Community Christmas Shoebox Project

Kickoff Date: Sunday September 26

Again this year, CUMC will serve the local Greenleigh Mobile Home Community by providing Christmas gift boxes to approximately 180 children in need. The age groups we will focus on are boys and girls ages 2-3, 4-6, 7-9, and 10-12. Age-appropriate small toys can be put in each box. Examples are dolls, balls, stuffed animals, puzzles, yoyos, bubbles, cars, etc. Also hair accessories, brush, comb, toothbrush, ChapStick, toiletries, school supplies, socks, and jewelry may be added. DO NOT INCLUDE CANDY, GUM, OR TOY WEAPONS.



HOW TO DO IT:

1. GET a shoebox to pack. Wrap top and bottom with gift wrap.
2. After preparing your gift box, return it to church LABELED GIRL OR BOY AND AGE GROUP, either 2-3, 4-6, 7-9, or 10-12. Large rubber bands will be available to secure the lid. Please do not seal box.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

Congregational Finance update through July 31, 2021

General operating fund checking account balance is \$147,142.55

Projected giving for our 2021 budget based on first 30 weeks contributions is \$769,922.19



The church and preschool PPP loan totaling \$85,190.40 has been forgiven as of August 16, 2021. This was our second grant from the Small Business Administration and has been vital to maintaining our financial liquidity throughout Covid.



HISTORY IN THE MAKING

At the eleven o'clock service one Sunday in January 1955, Mrs. E. Thomas Hatcher was honored for having completed 47 years of service in the Church and Sunday School. A lovely silver vase inscribed with her name and number of years of service was presented to her. Mrs. Hatcher had held many offices in addition to having inaugurated a Cradle Roll Department in 1913 and a Home Life Department for shut-ins soon after. More than 200 babies were enrolled and recognized annually on their respective birthdays until the Cradle Roll ceased. Louise Ruffin Goodwyn (Bill Goodwyn's mother) was the first baby to be enrolled. There are several current members of our Church who were in the Cradle Roll: Kitty Lipscomb, Tam Moody, Carolyn Maxwell, Pat Jones, Daphne Curtis, Marian Curtis Perkinson, Mary Musselwhite, and others.



BOOK REVIEW:


"Nevertheless She Preached" by Rev. Dr. Marg Kutz

Even though I am not a literary critic, I offered to review Marg's book for the church friends who enjoy reading. If you think it's just for clergy, or just for history buffs, you are wrong. I'd never heard of Lillian Russell or Mildred Long, nor did I care much about the history of United Methodists in Virginia, honestly. But now that I've read the book, I see how very relevant it is today. Are we not again debating who can be a pastor? What is God's will, when it comes to leading believers?

Marg researched and interviewed many people. She succeeded in bringing to life two women, Lillian and Mildred, who responded to God's call. I enjoyed hearing about Danville, Virginia's boom with the textile industry, and many sites and familiar names from Richmond and Petersburg. Our own Cynthia Corley is in the book too. I was also reminded how far women have come in the workplace. It never occurred to me that I could not meet with my boss about a business matter behind closed doors. But for Lillian and Mildred to meet with their district superintendent, his wife needed to sit inside the room as well, for propriety's sake. There are many instances when you might laugh at the absurdity, by today's standards, of decisions they had to make while breaking ground for future leaders. I'd recommend the book to anyone who appreciates seeing God clearly at work in people's lives.
